#### Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> June 11:00 - 12:00 Douglas Maxwell: Setting the Stage

A son of Girvan, and one of Scotland's top playwrights since his debut in 2000, his home town often features as a location in his work, which has been produced in almost every theatre in Scotland, and across the world: *Our Bad Magnet*, a play set in Girvan, ran for over a decade in South Korea and is currently being staged in Tokyo in a Japanese translation.

His recent work includes the musical *Orphans*, *Man's Best Friend*, and the BAFTA-nominated *Fatbaws*, with Peter Mullan.

Douglas will be talking about how Girvan shaped his work, the Scottish theatre scene, and making a life as a writer.

Marion, a local writer of two children's books, and a regular at South Ayrshire Libraries, was inspired to write *Granny Came to Visit* for a friend who showered her grandchild with knitted gifts. It was awarded first prize by the Scottish Association of Writers in 2020. *The Friendship Bench*, her second children's book, was published in 2022.

Marion's workshop will be interactive, with the children joining in, making paper hats and generally having fun.

Lex, reared in Barr, has worked man and boy building and mending boats at Alexander Noble & Sons' boatyard at Newton Kennedy in Girvan.

A family man, Lex has seen the change from working with predominantly wooden fishing vessels, for which 'Nobles' is famous, to building steel boats for Scotland's rapidly expanding fishfarming industry, and maintaining the UK and Ireland's fleet of RNLI lifeboats.

#### Sunday 4th June 11:00 - 12:00 Alex Wilson: Woodturning Workshop

Working with native hardwood species like oak, ash, yew, beech, sycamore, and especially spalted beech, Alex, a retired education professional from Cumnock, has been turning wood for over twenty years. Turning a hobby into a passion, he likes to allow the beauty of the wood to speak for itself.

Sustainability is vital, and Alex will not use imported or exotic timber unless it is reclaimed stock. Most of the timber he uses is from local woodlands in Ayrshire, much of it already fallen. He is a member of The Association of Woodturners of Great Britain and the Ayrshire Woodturning Club, where he regularly demonstrates woodturning projects.



#### Sunday 4th June 12:30 - 1:30 Scott Murdoch: Mackerel, Sea to Plate

The head chef at Culzean Castle and Country Park, Scott joined Turnberry Hotel as a 16-year-old junior in 2001 and, since then, has worked in kitchens in London, Cornwall and France, where he cooked in a 2-Michelin star restaurant. After another stint at Turnberry, he jumped at the chance to run the kitchen at Culzean, developing menus for other National Trust for Scotland sites as part of his remit.

A trio of Mackerel: pate, pan fried, and pickled, will showcase Scott's skills, from filleting to curing, and will whet your appetite. You will be able to taste Scott's food at the end of the demonstration.

## **Sunday 4th June 2:00 - 3:00 Frances McArthur: The Art of Quilting**

Frances has sewed and embroidered all her life, taught by her mother and aunts. In her forties she enrolled on a City & Guilds Embroidery course at the local college, which was an eye-opener.

Learning new techniques about embroidery which she didn't know existed, she was encouraged to visit galleries, museums, and quilt shows, taking in everything, not only textiles. Coming across 'art quilts', hanging on the wall, Frances was hooked, having always believed patchwork was meant just for bed coverings.



### Sunday 4th June 3:30 - 4:30 Jack Lowe: The Lifeboat Station Project

Photography has been in Jack Lowe's blood since, aged 8, he received a Kodak Instamatic camera from his grandmother, and from childhood he's had a love of lifeboats. After a career in photography, Jack needed a new project, and he had the idea of travelling to all 238 RNLI lifeboat stations in the UK and Ireland to photograph them, in order to preserve a vital aspect of our island nation's culture for generations to come.

And there's a twist! Jack works as the Victorians used to, making the photographs on glass plates from his mobile darkroom, a decommissioned ambulance called Neena. His work will also be shown in the Art exhibition.



### Sunday 4th June 5:00 - 6:00, South Parish Church Strathclyde Chamber Choir £5

Formed in 1980, the choir has a repertoire ranging from plainsong and renaissance music to the *a capella* staples of the 20<sup>th</sup> century and more contemporary work. The choir is self-funding, and performs regularly at Durham Cathedral and York Minster. They have toured widely abroad, recorded for BBC Radios 2,3, and 4, and have released a CD of Scottish part songs. In 2022 they performed Nitin Sawney's *About us* work at Paisley Abbey.

The choir has been led by its musical director, Alan Tavener, BEM, since its foundation, and is assisted by the associate conductor, Michael Graham.

This concert will have a focus on Scottish music, both old favourites and contemporary pieces, including new work by Tom Cunningham, set to words by Alexander McCall Smith.
