Top Scottish playwright Douglas Maxwell's work has been produced in almost every theatre in Scotland, and across the world: *Our Bad Magnet*, a play set in Girvan, ran for over a decade in South Korea and is currently being staged in Tokyo in a Japanese translation.

His recent work includes the musical *Orphans*, *Man's Best Friend*, and the BAFTA-nominated *Fatbaws*, with Peter Mullan.

During this interactive session, Douglas will be taking ten lucky participants through the process of writing a script for the stage, passing on the knowledge that he has accumulated over his illustrious career.

Those taking part will also have a chance to write a short script as part of the event.

Elizabeth McKay is a children's author from Dalry in North Ayrshire and has had hundreds of stories and articles published in a variety of magazines.



Phoebe Crawford is a curator, musician and writer from West Yorkshire, now living and working in Glasgow. She has a passion for socially engaged art and community.

Phoebe studied Curating at Goldsmiths University of London, and more recently completed a master's degree in Curatorial Practice from the Glasgow School of Art.

Phoebe will be delivering a talk about her most recent project, a film entitled *Which Way to Ailsa Craig?* which she made in collaboration with the community of Girvan. Narrated by people Phoebe met along the way, the film follows a failed attempt to visit Ailsa Craig, and explores themes of oral history and insight by reflecting on Girvan and its community.

Phoebe's talk will be accompanied by a short screening of the film, followed by a question and answer session.

Jeff Zycinski is the author of *The Red Light Zone* and *Travels from my Twilight Zone*, about his career before and after his time at the BBC including twelve years in charge of BBC Radio in Scotland, and his childhood, growing up in the east end of Glasgow as the seventh son of a Polish sailor who settled in Scotland after World War 2.

He's most commonly asked - mainly by his wife Anne -*What the heck goes on inside that head of yours?* In this talk he tries to answer that question as he recalls his experiences in Hollywood, his brief stint as a stand-up comedian and how a routine trip to the dentist ended with a shock diagnosis of mouth cancer, life-saving surgery and a decision to take up a new challenge, running a charity that helps elderly and disabled people get the most out of life.

The Headscarf Revolutionaries

Brian W Lavery was born in Glasgow's East End, the fourth of six sons, to a sheet metal worker and a shop assistant. Brian has been a factory worker, car valet, market trader, waiter, university dropout, VAT officer and latterly a journalist, university tutor and writer.

He spent more than 30 years in journalism before undertaking a first-class joint honours degree and a doctorate in creative writing at Hull. He held top-level posts on several national and international newspapers, was news editor of two regional papers and edited three weekly papers.

His books include The Headscarf Revolutionaries (2015) and The Luckiest Thirteen (2017) both about the hardships and tragedy that surrounded the Hull Arctic fishing Fleet in the late 1960s, and the bravery of the women who decided enough was enough.

Stephen Watt is the Poetry Editor for Nutmeg Football Magazine and the author of five poetry collections. In 2016. Stephen was appointed Poet-in-Residence at Dumbarton Football Club and became the first crime poet to appear at Bloody Scotland, the international crime-writing festival. Other titles include being appointed Poet-in-Chief for the Hampden Collection in 2018 and Makar for the Federation of Writers (Scotland) in 2019.

Among the awards won by Stephen are the Poetry Rivals Slam, the StAnza International Digital Poetry Prize, the Tartan Treasures award, and he was the inaugural winner of the Liverpool Poetry Prize, judged by Roger McGough.

Stephen's work has appeared in a French art gallery, a German chapel, and the American metro system, and he has edited two punk poetry collections: Ashes To Activists for the Joe Strummer Foundation and Pogo Serotonin for Buzzcocks. Since 2016, Stephen's side project has been the gothic spoken word/music collaboration, Neon Poltergeist.

Violently gang raped when she was 13 years old, and raped three times more before the age of 18, Madeleine has experienced more trauma in her life than most ever will. Living in a state of shock and self-loathing, it took her years of struggle to confront the buried memories of that first attack and begin to undo the damage it wrought, as men continued to take advantage of her fragility in the worst possible way.

Madeleine, who gives inspirational talks worldwide, discusses how forgiveness, living the best life she could, and sharing her story through her book, her podcast, her talks and her appearances on radio and TV, gave her back her life and inspired her to become an advocate for others.

A self-employed traditional sign writer and decorative artist based locally, Jamie specialises in traditional hand-painted signs and bespoke artistic work.

He spent 3 years at Glasgow College of Building and Printing, studying Interior Design and Advanced Signwork Craft. After travelling in New Zealand and Australia for 18 months, working for several sign manufacturers and occasionally being commissioned for hand-painted signs or bespoke artwork, he returned home to Pinwherry in 1997 to start his own signwriting business, from vintage vehicles to traditional shop signs, branching out to restoring chancel ceilings, painting wall murals and signs for a film set.

Our pricing policy & lottery funding

We wish to make the events at the Girvan Arts Festival inclusive, so the prices for

most of this year's events have remained at £5. We were delighted to have been awarded a substantial grant from Creative Scotland through the lottery fund, which helps immensely, but if you feel you can afford to pay more, it would greatly benefit future Girvan Arts Festivals if you could afford donate a little extra, as cash at the box office or online.

Our lottery funding has also enabled us to:

- provide transport to allow those in outlying rural areas to attend the festival.
- Put on one-off events during the year under the umbrella of the Girvan Arts Festival. Keep an eye on the website and social media for news.
- Work with Girvan Academy on a number of exciting projects.

We are very excited to have teamed up with Girvan Academy for this year's festival, and the pupils will be



playing a big part in the event - there will be a youth art exhibition at the school and some of the students' photography will be shown at the main exhibition in the Wee School Art Space.

And the pupils will be involved in the QR Code Trail which will take visitors on an art tour of Girvan.

A few of our festival speakers have pledged to visit the school and Douglas Maxwell, our patron, will talk to the pupils about his work and kick start a playwrighting competition, with a drama evening later in the year to showcase some of the talent that the academy boasts.

Pupils will also be volunteering in and around the festival, including being photographers and journalists, reporting on the events as they happen.

The Girvan Community Garden

Most of the festival events take place in the wonderful Girvan Community Garden. The Garden provides a space for the community and creates opportunities for everyone to engage in horticultural events throughout year. It is a positive, safe, and welcoming environment to improve health and welfare, broaden skills in gardening, and create a vibrant, inclusive and multi-generational community.

The Dome is a fairly recent addition to the Garden, and we are delighted to host most of our speakers here. Hot food
